B owls. Large, small, green, wavy moss topped. Gordon Ford's workshop is loaded with handturned wooden bowls in various stages of completion. Stacked up high on a shelf are bowls, turned, but green. They will stay there for a year to 'dry out'. Over by the table saw are the stacks of dried bowls, ready for their final turn at the sander.

Not a woodworker by trade, Gordon first graduated from UBC as a Geologist, a career that took him to many places around the globe. Working as a field Geologist in Australia, Costa Rica and Northern Quebec, he took the remaining courses needed to become a Geological Engineer. From there his focus was mineral exploration, before working as a Government Technical Advisor in mining and smelting. When talking with Gordon one can sense his love of the rock formations that has transferred to his current, prolific hobby.

Bowls made of 'refugees from the woodpile' occupy his thoughts now. He no longer just splits firewood. Each piece of wood is carefully scrutinized for it's hidden potential. Neighbours and friends call Gordon when they have a tree down, giving him first pick. Many of them have been recipients of Gordon's generosity in the form of a bowl, which is what prompted his involvement with the Lady Minto Hospital Foundation.

According to Gordon, "There are only so many family and friends you can give a bowl away to." Now, when someone offers to buy one of his handmade treasures, he says, "Great, and please send your cheque to the Hospital Foundation."

We are always amazed at the way people find to support the Foundation and we are grateful to such open hearted philanthropy. We have many wonderful donors that continually think of us for their charitable giving. We are honored to have been able to feature one such individual. As Gordon took me through

From start to finish he keeps an eye out for cracks and flaws, but throws none of them out. He is always on the lookout for a creative technique, a way to bring out the best both he and the wood have to offer.

The Foundation is pleased that Gordon allowed us to interview and photograph him. Unfortunately, Gordon and his wife Lucy will be moving to the Mainland as soon as their house sells, to be closer to their two daughters. I have no doubt that Gordon will go on to spread more goodwill in their new location amongst family and old friends. And the bowl I picked out as my favourite...well, Gordon said it might not be dry by the time they leave Salt Spring. ■

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
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### Everyday Ways to Give ...

As most of you have read, the Vancouver Island Health Authority (VIHA) has recently completed a health needs assessment for Salt Spring Island and this review was spearheaded by VIHA's Regional Director for Planning and Community Engagement, Grant Hollett, who met with approximately 16 interest groups on the island. The results of his assessment have now been finalized and our fundraising will continue to benefit local high priority health care services in the hospital to meet community needs as identified in the report's results. I am pleased that this report confirms the ongoing need and support for endoscopy procedures in addition to addressing the important psychiatric, geriatric, diagnostic (including the laboratory) and emergency requirements.

I am pleased to inform you that notwithstanding the global recession, the Foundation's Endowment Fund has held its own with the market value at \$3.25 Million as of March 31st 2010, a considerable increase over the value reported at March 31st 2009.

Dr. Morse, the new General Internist, continues to perform regular endoscopy procedures at the hospital and

provide consultations for patients referred by their family doctor.

In the 2009/10 fiscal year, we have spent \$145,000 on equipment and projects, with additional items still in the works valued at \$85,000. This brings the Foundation's commitment to a total of \$230,000. Some of the purchases include minor items (under \$5,000) such as emergency room intruments, Medicart for endoscopy, and tonometer. Other items include furniture for the nurses' accommodation, a new cardiac treadmill, mobile digital (Fast) ultrasound system, nurses' education fund, cardiac monitor, emergency room procedure lamps and replacement of the digital fluoroscopic system X-Ray equipment.

Lady Minto Hospital continues to be one of the jewels on Salt Spring, thanks largely to its excellent and dedicated staff.

On behalf of the Foundation Board I hope you all enjoy a fabulous summer and we continue to be grateful to all our supporters and donors for their generous help with our various programs each year.

# DEPARTMENT PROFILE **HEALTH RECORDS**

Kathy Tina Elaine Melanie Leah Janet **Casuals:** Pat Connie Mihaela Kristine Lori Wendy Julia When I asked Kathy Kendall, Health Records/ Admitting Coordinator, to describe her department in a nutshell, she said, "You practically have to be perfect to work here!" What she was referring to was the absolute need for accuracy when working with patient records, and the ability to maintain accuracy even under pressure and while multi-tasking, which are apt descriptions of what the pace is like in her department. "Flexible, problem-solving, and morphing into change constantly" are also ways to describe her staff during a day in the life of the Health Records and Admitting Departments (the checklist of duties is three pages long!). "You have to have your eye on the big picture here and be technically inclined. We manage the department using a lean design, which means streamlining duties to create greater efficiencies. We have to be very creative with staff and train them to cover a variety of duties while working with a lean budget."

There are six regular staff members and seven casual staff covering the various duties of this department. Kathy is responsible for the Admitting Clerks, Unit Clerks and Health Records Clerk/Medical Stenographers and many of the casual staff members are proficient in all the positions.

One major change that has taken place over the nearly 30 years that Kathy has worked in the department is the pivotal role of computer technology, referred to as Information Management and Information Technology (IM/ IT) within the health authority. Using a sophisticated computer program called Cerner, staff enter and manage patient data and records which can be accessed anywhere in the system by authorized staff. This means greater continuity and less chance of delays when it comes to patient care. Doctors can now review results right away for patients undergoing diagnostic testing in Victoria, and x-rays can be reviewed in the doctor's office, using another program called "Power Chart". Eventually, the patient records will be entirely electronic (paperless), although it will be a while before this takes place in the hospital system.

Keeping up with this new technology is another responsibility that Kathy must cover in her role as Coordinator, and this often involves teaching the specific computer skills to new staff and physicians. She is also responsible for security and privacy awareness and is the official "Freedom of Information" coordinator for the hospital. In this role, she is responsible for ensuring the privacy and security of all health information and also responding to requests for records. All computers in the hospital are password protected and there are strict guidelines on how to ensure that privacy is maintained at all times.

Another area of expertise is the coding and abstracting of all medical charts. This data is then filed with the Ministry of Health and compiled in province-wide health reports.

When you visit Lady Minto Hospital for blood tests, x-rays, ultrasounds, daycare procedures, emergency or if you are admitted to hospital, you will first encounter the Admitting Clerk, or during off-hours, the Unit Clerk at the Acute Care Nursing Station. The Admitting Clerks handle many tasks throughout the day, including appointments, switchboard, handling the mail, processing standing orders, processing the paperwork for all patients reporting to the hospital for tests or admission and assembling the chart. "They are very versatile staff," Kathy states, "with a broad knowledge of the health care system. The Unit Clerk performs additional duties, including arranging for patient transfers, transcribing medical orders, providing clerical support for the extended care unit and stocking the supplies cupboard on Acute Care, to name a few. "

The Health Records Medical Stenographers transcribe all medical reports, using the Fusion Manager dictation equipment. Gone are the days of the tape recorders for this task. All physicians can log onto this digital system through the telephone and dictate their reports from any location.

As with most departments in health care these days, Health Records has certainly undergone major advances technically, with an ever-expanding role in information management, but the major responsibility of keeping patient information accurate, secure and confidential is still at the top of the priority list. This is where the skills and ability to problem-solve and juggle many tasks come into play. Kathy and her staff run a tight ship and show us each day what teamwork is all about. Kathy attributes the success of the department to remarkable teamwork of the amazing, accomplished and dedicated Health Records, Admitting and Unit clerk staff. ■

# **Palliative Care Room on Extended Care**

Long time Salt Spring resident and supporter of the Lady Minto Hospital Foundation, Ken Lee, was most appreciative of the new Palliative Care Room on the Extended Care Unit when his daughter Gillian required special care at the hospital. When asked to provide some feedback about his experience, Ken most willingly spoke up on behalf the family, including Gillian's brother, Ingmar and her sister, Jennifer:

"Looking back over Gillian's short stay and eventual passing at the ECU, we all agreed that her placement and care there was an incredible, almost miraculous, stroke of good fortune for all of us.

Gillian was placed in Extended Care in May 2009. She had spent about three weeks in Acute Care where her restlessness and frustration at being confined resulted in her occasionally falling out of bed and alarming her roommates. She was very fortunate to be placed from there into the ECU's newly created palliative care room which includes a private courtyard. Her bed could be easily wheeled from her room into the

courtyard — she always loved the outdoors. The doctors were also able to better adjust her medications and mitigate her symptoms in that setting. The ECU nursing and maintenance staff were wonderful and extremely supportive in spite of their unfamiliarity with Huntington's — a very rare, neuro-degenerative disease. It was always a pleasure to visit Gillian and to get to know everyone on the unit, including the other patients and their daily visitors — it was like family.

We also agree that this wonderful facility deserves a better name than ECU. Might we suggest the CROFTON WING after the road to the Lady Minto and the picturesque Village?"

# FOUNDATION SUPPORTS MUCH NEEDED ACCOMMODATION FOR NURSING STAFF




ver the past two years, Lady Minto Hospital has been grappling with a serious shortage of nursing staff and has needed to call on the services of an agency to provide adequate coverage for both the acute care and extended care units. Agency nurses are called on short notice and provide shift coverage as required. This often involves overnight stays of several weeks and Lady Minto Hospital is responsible for providing accommodation during their stay. The Foundation Board was happy to assist with this important need and when the opportunity for V.I.H.A. to lease appropriate accommodations at the Kings Lane Medical Clinic came up, the Board approved the purchase of essential furnishings for the apartment.

The new accommodation has two bedrooms and is in walking distance from the hospital which was an important consideration when choosing this location as many of the agency nurses do not bring a car.

The Kings Lane Medical Clinic officially opened on March 29<sup>th</sup> and provides





medical offices for Drs. Barclay, Gummeson, Ryan and Sadouski. Dr. Morse, our General Internist, who is now performing endoscopy procedures at the hospital, also sees patients in the clinic on Tuesdays. ■
